### The First Days

Your puppy is quickly learning the benefits of being the only puppy in the home. They may even begin to respond to their new call name. Clearly puppies cannot speak, but as you bond with each other and you learn to understand your puppy's body language, you will recognize when your puppy is stressed or needs a break from all of their new experiences. You should not feel guilty giving your puppy quiet time in his or her crate.






## Bonding With Your Puppy



### Become the Pack Leader

Dogs are pack animals by nature and your puppy will quickly learn they are part of a new pack. They know what to expect when they are with us, but will be looking to determine their status in their new environment. They want a pack leader and if that's not clear, it will fall



#### **Bedtime**

You will need to implement a bedtime routine. Even though your puppy's crate may be on another level of our home to your bedroom, your puppy will still bond with you. A puppy who isn't given crate time during the day and held and played with all day, will have a harder time adjusting to the crate in the evening. We don't leave human babies home alone but we do leave our fur babies home alone. For that reason, you cannot associate human emotions with your puppy's crying. Remember, they are trying to understand their new routine and the new rules of their pack.

This is a special time with your new puppy. They will only be this age for a short time and they will quickly bond with you and the loved ones they are socialized with. The key to bonding with your fur baby, while training, is to be consistent throughout the process.
